Brewer City Council Tours Penobscot County Jail, Discusses Need for New Facility

In an effort to better understand the current conditions and challenges faced by the Penobscot County Jail, members of the Brewer City Council toured the facility with Sheriff Troy Morton last month. The visit was part of an ongoing discussion about the pressing need for a new jail to address overcrowding, aging infrastructure, and improve overall safety and efficiency.

Overcrowding Concerns

One of the most significant issues highlighted during the tour was the severe overcrowding within the jail. Originally built to house a much smaller population, the Penobscot County Jail has been operating well beyond its capacity for years. Currently, the facility is designed to hold 143 inmates but regularly accommodates more, This overcrowding not only poses risks to inmate safety but also creates a challenging environment for staff to maintain order and provide necessary services.

Aging Infrastructure

The jail's aging infrastructure is another critical concern. Built in 1869, many parts of the facility are outdated, with some areas showing significant wear and tear. The mechanical systems, including plumbing and heating, are frequently in need of repair, leading to increased maintenance costs and disruptions. Additionally, the outdated design of the facility does not meet modern standards for security and rehabilitation, making it difficult to implement effective inmate programs and services.

Safety and Security Issues

Safety and security are paramount in any correctional facility, and the Penobscot County Jail is no exception. However, the current layout and condition of the jail present numerous challenges in this regard. The design does not allow for optimal monitoring of inmates. Moreover, the lack of adequate space means that inmates with behavioral issues or those who pose a higher risk cannot be properly isolated, endangering both staff and other inmates. Moreover, a new facility would better facilitate mental health and substance use care.

Financial Implications

While building a new jail would require a significant initial investment, the long-term financial benefits cannot be ignored. The current facility's high maintenance costs and inefficiencies are a drain on county resources. A new, modern jail would be more cost-effective to operate, with lower maintenance requirements and improved energy efficiency. Additionally, a facility designed to meet current standards would be better equipped to support rehabilitation programs, potentially reducing recidivism rates and associated costs in the long run.

Next Steps

Following the tour, the Brewer City Council went away with a heightened awareness of the urgent need for a new jail. Discussions are expected to continue as council members, county officials, and the community explore potential funding options and design plans for a new facility. Public input will be a crucial part of this process, ensuring that if a new jail is built, it meets the needs of all stakeholders while addressing the current facility's shortcomings.

As the conversation progresses, the Brewer City Council remains committed to finding a solution that enhances safety, efficiency, and the overall effectiveness of the county's correctional system. The tour of the Penobscot County Jail has undoubtedly provided valuable insights that will inform future decisions and actions in this critical endeavor.

Getchell Ice Property Redevelopment

In 2023, the Economic Development office applied for and received a grant from the Maine Department of Environmental Protection (MDEP) to conduct an environmental assessment of the former Getchell Ice site prior to a potential city purchase. This grant does not provide direct funding to the city but instead offers assessment services funded and overseen by the MDEP. As a result of this grant, MDEP hired Beacon Environmental Consultants to perform a Phase II Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) and to develop an Analysis of Brownfield Cleanup Alternatives (ABCA).

As a requirement of this grant, the city has made the ABCA, the Phase II ESA, and the Community Involvement Plan (CIP) available to the public. These documents are available for download and review on the <u>City website</u>. They can also be reviewed in person at City Hall during regular business hours. The final requirement of this grant program is a public hearing at the upcoming City Council meeting scheduled for August 13 at 6 pm. Any person may attend this public meeting, and written comments may also be submitted. In May, after receiving the results of these assessments, the City of Brewer purchased the former Getchell Building at 1 and 11 Union Street. Our intent is to address the remaining environmental issues that were not already resolved by Getchell Bros. and then sell the property for redevelopment, aiming to benefit the city and complement the waterfront area. Since purchasing the site, the Economic Development office has successfully applied for a second grant from the MDEP, this time for remediation. Like the previous grant, this one will again provide services, rather than direct funding, for the work. According to the MDEP Brownfields manager, "Some of the other cost estimates in the Analysis of Brownfields Cleanup Alternatives (ABCA) were for doing cleanup of soil such that the site could be used for residential use, so those numbers were much higher. We aren't doing that soil removal since property use will be restricted to commercial use, and because of the high cost (to remediate to the standard for residential sites)." MDEP anticipates the cost of asbestos abatement and the removal of universal/hazardous waste (such as fluorescent lights and small containers of paint) to be between \$35,000 and \$50,000 and has agreed to provide this service through the grant, provided that actual bids align with the estimated costs. This means there will be no cost to the city for this work.

Facility Design Update

Last month, MWS conducted an onsite meeting with our key technology suppliers and design engineers to advance engineering activities kicked off in May. A team of over ten people flew in from locations both domestically and in Canada and Europe. The objective of the two-day meeting was to review progress to date, agree upon key design aspects, and refine the near- and medium-term project engineering schedule and deliverables. This was an important step toward reopening the facility. We then provided the DEP an up-to-date overview of our project to facility dialogue around key design considerations needed to be addressed during the permit revision application process. This will help make for a smoother permitting process to facility proven technological advances in waste processing and recycling.

Materials Management & Maine Climate Council

The Climate Council of which MRC's Executive Director served on the Materials Management Task Force held an event in Augusta drawing a crowd of over 150 attendees. The meeting provided a comprehensive overview of the strategies developed by the various working groups over the past six months. Each group, comprising an average of thirty to forty experts in their respective fields, presented their findings. The groups were as follows.

This state-of-the-art Green Bin Processing Facility has design features similar to those Innovative envisions for Hampden's, including additional digester design and capacity expansions. The tour, led by Toronto city representatives and technical engineers, gave us valuable insights. The facility and the equipment we observed have been in operation for over ten years, maintaining fantastic condition. This facility processes approximately 80,000 tons of organics for Toronto residents, making our visit a truly inspiring experience.
